PURPOSE

- 1. This assurance review aims to:
 - assess whether parliamentarians' travel on and around 7 November 2019 meets the dominant purpose test in section 26 of the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017; and
 - if a parliamentarian was accompanied by a family member at Commonwealth expense, assess whether the family member's travel meet the 3 requirements set out in section 6 of the Parliamentary Business Resources Regulations 2017.

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2. Value for money and other conditions (sections 27 and 28 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*) were not assessed.

BACKGROUND

- 3. The former Prime Minister, the Hon Tony Abbott AC, held the seat of Warringah until the 2019 Federal election. A dinner paying tribute (Tribute Dinner) to his 25 years in politics was held on 7 November 2019. The Tribute Dinner was hosted by the NSW Liberal Party and held at Miramare Gardens in Terrey Hills, Sydney.
- 4. In accordance with IPEA's protocol on dealing with misuse of parliamentary work expenses (Attachment A), on 13 January 2020 IPEA commenced an assurance review of travel and travel-related work expenses accessed to attend the Tribute Dinner.

LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

- 5. The legislative framework (the Framework) relating to this matter includes:
 - Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017 (PBR Act 2017)
 - Parliamentary Business Resources Regulations 2017 (the Regulations)
 - Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017 (the Determination).

Obligations

6. The principles based legislative framework imposes a number of obligations on parliamentarians in relation to their use of public resources. In summary, parliamentarians are personally responsible and accountable for their use of public resources. They must be prepared to publicly justify their use of public resources for conducting their parliamentary business and must act ethically and in good faith in using, and accounting for the use of, those resources. Specifically, a parliamentarian must not claim public resources unless they are claimed for the dominant purpose of conducting their parliamentary business.

Definitions

- 7. "Parliamentary business" has the meaning given by section 6 of the PBR Act 2017. Activities that fall within the four duty streams of parliamentary business are set out in the Determination as "parliamentary duties", "electorate duties", "party political duties", and "official duties" (Attachment B).
- 8. Subsection 6(2) of the PBR Act further provides that an activity is not the parliamentary business of the member if it is carried out for the dominant purpose of providing a personal benefit to the member or another person or pursuing commercial purposes of the member or another person (or both).

9. 'Family reunion purposes' has the meaning given by section 6 of the Regulations:

A family member of a parliamentarian travels for family reunion purposes if:

- (a) the member is travelling within Australia for the dominant purpose of conducting the member's parliamentary business; and
- (b) the family member travels to accompany or join the parliamentarian; and
- (c) the travel by the family member is for the dominant purpose of facilitating the family life of the parliamentarian's family.

INFORMATION OBTAINED

- 10. IPEA obtained an internal report (created from data held by IPEA) with the following parameters:
 - Travel conducted by any current parliamentarian (including family member) who travelled to and from Sydney and used travel-related work expenses in Sydney from 5 - 9 November 2019.
- 11. The report was reviewed to identify parliamentarians who were in Sydney on the evening of 7 November 2019, and therefore had an opportunity to attend the Tribute Dinner.
- 12. IPEA reviewed all vFire records (which record IPEA's communications with parliamentarians and their staff) for relevant information/advice provided in relation to a parliamentarian's attendance to the Tribute Dinner:
 - only 2 vFire records were logged, one from
 - · no other vFire records were found.
- 13. IPEA also reviewed social and news media surrounding the Tribute Dinner.

ANALYSIS

- 14. Upon IPEA's preliminary review, seven parliamentarians were identified to have been in Sydney on 7 November 2019 at the time of the Tribute Dinner:
 - · Senator the Hon Eric Abetz;
 - · Hon Kevin Andrews MP;
 - Hon Peter Dutton MP, Minister for Home Affairs;
 - · Hon Josh Frydenberg MP, Treasurer;
 - · Hon Greg Hunt MP, Minister for Health;
 - Hon Ben Morton MP, Assistant Minister to the Prime Minister and Cabinet; and
 - Mr Llew O'Brien MP, now Deputy Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- 15. To test that their use of travel-related work expenses was in accordance with the Framework, these parliamentarians were contacted and the following questions, together with a list of their travel-related work expenses on and around 7 November 2019, were presented to them for their consideration and response:
 - "What was the dominant purpose in accessing each of the travel-related work expenses listed?"
 - "What was the nature of your parliamentary business in Sydney?"

 If the parliamentarian was accompanied by their spouse; "Did your spouse's travel meet the three part test set out in clause 6 of the Parliamentary Business Resources Regulations 2017"?

Parliamentary Business - Ministers Dutton, Frydenberg and Hunt, Assistant Minister Morton and Deputy Speaker O'Brien

- 16. Ministers Dutton, Frydenberg and Hunt, Assistant Minister Morton and Deputy Speaker O'Brien used work resources to travel to Sydney for the dominant purpose of parliamentary business other than the Tribute Dinner and did not use work resources to travel to the Tribute Dinner while in Sydney. None of this group accessed work resources to travel within Sydney to the Tribute Dinner, or advised that they considered the Tribute Dinner a parliamentary business purpose of their travel to Sydney (dominant purpose or otherwise).
- 17. Each of these parliamentarians provided detailed responses to the questions posed by IPEA, advising that the dominant purpose of their travel to Sydney was for parliamentary business, and particularising the nature of the relevant parliamentary business. Each of these responses are included at Attachments C, D, E, F and G.
- 18. Given the detailed responses outlining the parliamentary business in Sydney that was the dominant purpose for each of their travel to Sydney, and the fact that no public resources were accessed to travel within Sydney to the Tribute Dinner, IPEA is of the view that the use of travel and travel-related resources in these instances were accessed for the dominant purpose of parliamentary business and were not inconsistent with section 26 the PBR Act.

Parliamentary Business - Hon Kevin Andrews MP

- 19. Mr Andrews accessed work resources (COMCAR) to travel within Sydney to the Tribute Dinner, describing the Tribute Dinner as being the parliamentary business that was the dominant purpose of that use of COMCAR. Mr Andrews also cited the Tribute Dinner as a parliamentary business purpose for his travel to Sydney.
- 20. Mr Andrews used work resources to travel to Sydney and provided several examples of his parliamentary business in Sydney, one of which was the Tribute Dinner. He did not claim TA for the night of 7 November 2019. Mr Andrews also attended a and had a meeting scheduled with the NSW Attorney General to discuss an inquiry into the family law system. It is and the family law system are likely to be matters of interest to at least some of his constituents.
- 21. He also travelled within Sydney for the Tribute Dinner (using COMCAR) and advised it was for the dominant purpose of parliamentary business. He relevantly advised (Attachment I):

As I was in Sydney for these meetings, I also attended a testimonial dinner for former Prime Minister, the Hon Tony Abbot MP. This event or function was attended by political, business, media and community leaders to mark the 25 years contribution to national life and public policy as a Member of Parliament, Minister and Prime Minister by Mr Abbott. I discussed a range of parliamentary matters including matters of national importance with various people, including Members of Parliament and senior members of the media.

Accordingly, the travel involved Electorate Duties, as defined by the legislative instruments, namely "participating in debate, discussion, a meeting, event or function, or undertaking research or administrative function relating to matters of importance or interest to constituents (including matters that do not relate exclusively to constituents, such as matters of national importance)."

22. In the Determination, Electorate Duties are defined in Schedule 2 as:

In the member's capacity as their constituent's elected representative:

- a) Facilitating and participating in debate, discussion, a meeting, event or function, or undertaking research or administrative functions relating to matters of importance or interest to constituents (including matters that do not relate exclusively to constituents, such as matters of national importance);
- b) Otherwise communicating with constituents;
- c) Representing the views and interests of constituents.
- 23. While paragraph 6(2)(b) of the PBR Act also provides that the Minister may determine certain activities are not parliamentary business for the purposes of the Act, the Minister has not exercised this power at this time. Rather, the Act currently provides that activities undertaken for the dominant purpose of both or either of the following are not parliamentary business:
 - providing a personal benefit to the member or another person, or
 - pursuing commercial purposes of the member or another person.
- 24. There is nothing in the information available to IPEA to suggest that the use of travel and travel related resources to take him to Sydney and back was not for the dominant purpose of the parliamentary business he particularised in his response. Mr Andrews advises the dominant purpose related to and Family Law meetings and that he attended the dinner "[a]s I was in Sydney for these meetings..."
- 25. In relation to the use of COMCAR to travel to the Tribute Dinner, Mr Andrews advises attendance at the dinner is parliamentary business as per Schedule 2(a) of the Determination. IPEA notes the activities described at paragraph 19 above fall within the definition. IPEA further notes that such an event might appear to have a personal benefit to many in the Australian community. Ultimately, in a principles-based scheme the onus will be on the parliamentarian to justify the expense in the context of all of the circumstances

Family reunion Travel - Hon Kevin Andrews MP

26. In relation to his wife's travel, Mr Andrews advised:

I confirm that my spouse's travel was fulfilling clause 6.

27. Given IPEA's finding in relation to the dominant purpose of Mr Andrews' use of travel resources above, that he was accompanied by his spouse, and the fact that IPEA is not aware of any contradictory information, Mr Andrews' response effectively confirms that the final requirement for family reunion travel were met, that being that "(c) the travel by the family

member is for the dominant purpose of facilitating the family life of the parliamentarian's family." IPEA is satisfied that the travel was consistent with the requirements for family reunion travel at section 6 of the PBR Regulations.

Parliamentary Business - Senator the Hon Eric Abetz

- 28. Senator Abetz used work resources to travel to Sydney, and then within Sydney for the Tribute Dinner (COMCAR). He did not claim TA for the night of 7 November 2019. He advised his travel to Sydney, and to and from Terrey Hills, was for the dominant purpose of parliamentary business. Senator Abetz advises he attended the dinner "... to represent Tasmania ... at a national function..." Senator Abetz is a senator for Tasmania and advises (Attachment I) that his attendance complies with Schedule 2(a) of the Determination in part because Mr Abbott's pro-Tasmania policies have advantaged Tasmanians.
- 29. Further, Senator Abetz states that Schedule 2(c), (e) and (f) of the Determination applies to the travel to the Tribute Dinner because:

I had been approached by numerous stakeholders wishing to make representations to me who were attending the function and who had enquired as to my attendance to facilitate a quick meeting. Many such contacts were had before, during and after the function.

- 30. IPEA recognises that travel by Members of Parliament throughout Australia is an integral component of the role and function for a parliamentarian throughout their respective parliamentary term. Engaging with constituents and representing their electorate to better understand interests and needs for their region will at times require travel to be undertaken at Commonwealth expense.
- 31. As articulated in the PBR Act, Members of Parliament can only claim for expenses that are incurred for the dominant purpose of conducting parliamentary business. Parliamentary business is broadly defined and parts of that definition extend to the activities described by Senator Abetz such as meeting with stakeholders and hearing representations from constituents (see Schedule 2, Determination).
- 32. Guidance as to the operation of the 'dominant purpose' test can be obtained from the Explanatory Memorandum to the PBR Bill 2017 (EM), which explains that the test was introduced on the recommendation in 'An Independent Parliamentary Entitlements System' (February 2016). Dominant purpose attracts its ordinary meaning and refers to the ruling, prevailing or most influential purpose. The EM describes the test as:
 - ... whether, but for the parliamentary business, the member would have undertaken the activity; or incurred or claimed the expense, allowance or other public resource. Where they would have taken the same action without the parliamentary business, the test is not satisfied.
- 33. Senator Abetz has met the 'but for' test in that he does not indicate attendance at the event was incidental to some other parliamentary business, rather he asserts that attendance at the event was the parliamentary business. He states, "[t]he dominant, indeed only, purpose of my attendance at Terrey Hills was in furtherance of my electoral and parliamentary duties."

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34. Given the wide definition of parliamentary business the definition is satisfied. Given Senator Abetz states the activity (the Tribute Dinner) was the parliamentary business, the 'but for' test is satisfied.

Personal Responsibility and Good Faith

- 35. Under the principles-based Framework, a parliamentarian is personally responsible and accountable for their use of public resources and should consider how the public would perceive their use of these resources for travel in particular circumstances. Personal responsibility extends to the use of public resources in the parliamentarians' name by others who may be authorised to incur expenses within their office, or for family reunion purposes. A parliamentarian must be prepared to publicly justify their use of public resources and should consider how the public would perceive their use of public resources for travel in particular circumstances.
- 36. A review of publicly available information has revealed the following statements from (or purportedly on behalf of) Mr Andrews in relation to his attendance at the Tribute Dinner:

A spokesperson for Mr Andrews confirmed the MP was in Sydney on the day of Tony Abbott's farewell dinner, but declined to say if his wife also attended the event or if government cars were used to travel to and from the venue.

The spokesperson claimed Mr An	drews, who is a close friend and ally of Mr Abbott,
was in Sydney to attend an	consultation with the Prime
Minister — though the	website does not list any official meetings being
held that day.

- 37. Mr Andrews did not publicly justify his use of public resources when questioned by media for the purpose of the above article. IPEA is able to enforce compliance with sections 26, 27 and 28 of the PBR Act. Failure by a parliamentarian to comply with the personal responsibility and accountability obligations set out in section 25 of the PBR Act do not invoke a sanction.
- 38. A review of publicly available information has revealed Senator Abetz did not respond when questioned by the news media organisation for the purpose of the article referred to above, however he did make a post on Facebook regarding his attendance at the event (Attachment K).

CONCLUSION

39. After analysis of the records held by and available to IPEA, and the responses to the questions IPEA put to the parliamentarians, IPEA is of the view that the travel and travel-related resources used by Ministers Dutton, Frydenberg and Hunt, Assistant Minister Morton, Deputy Speaker O'Brien, Senator Abetz and Mr Andrews met the dominant purpose test set out in section 26 of the PBR Act.





Protocol—Dealing with Allegations of Misuse of Parliamentary Work Expenses

The Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority (IPEA) was established to provide greater accountability and transparency of the Parliamentary Work Expenses Framework (the Framework). IPEA provides assurance that parliamentarians' work resources and *Members of Parliament (Staff)*Act 1984 (MOP(S) Act) employees' travel resources are spent in compliance with the Framework.

IPEA deals with possible misuse of work or travel resources at arm's length from Government. The *Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority Act 2017* (IPEA Act) provides legislative powers for the auditing and reporting of parliamentarians' work and travel resources and MOP(S) Act travel resources.

When IPEA becomes aware of information that indicates possible non-compliance with the Framework, IPEA may conduct a preliminary assessment. The assessment scrutinises the use of the work or travel resource and determines if a parliamentary business resource has been used.

Possible misuse

In the event of possible misuse, IPEA decides whether to undertake an assurance review or audit of the matter. IPEA does not undertake assurance reviews or audits at the request of parliamentarians or MOP(S) Act employees.

- Under the IPEA Act, IPEA may audit any parliamentarian's work or travel resource or MOP(S) Act travel resource as it considers appropriate.
- IPEA may conduct an assurance review where a preliminary assessment indicates that a Commonwealth resource was used for a parliamentarian's work expense or MOP(S) Act employee's travel expense.
- IPEA may conduct an audit where there are allegations of systemic or substantial misuse
 of work expenses or where there is an educative benefit.
- An audit may also be a systematic and comprehensive examination of the use by all
 parliamentarians and/or MOP(S) Act employees of a specific category of work expense.
- The Members of the Authority or the Chief Executive Officer may issue a notice requiring a person to provide information that is relevant to an audit by IPEA, as provided for under Part 5 of the IPEA Act. Criminal penalties apply for failure to comply with a notice, or for providing false or misleading information.
- In the event of an audit, the parliamentarian or MOP(S) Act employee is accorded procedural fairness to provide comment on any findings.

Members of the Authority decide whether a matter is referred to the Australian Federal Police (AFP)

 The Minister responsible for the AFP and the Minister responsible for the Framework are notified of a referral to the AFP.

Publication of audits

Members of the Authority decide whether, or not, to publish their decision(s).

1 Name

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions

section of the Act, including the following:
(a) constituent;

- (b) *member*;
- (c) office holder, and
- (d) vice regal function.
- (2) For the avoidance of doubt, an activity specified in a Schedule to this determination is specified whether it takes place within Australia or overseas.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (1) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(a) of the Act, the *parliamentary duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 1 for that member.
- (2) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(b) of the Act, the *electorate duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 2 for that member.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.

I write in response to your correspondence of 4 May, which requested further information relating to travel expenses incurred in November of 2019.
The dominant purpose of my travel was for official duties, as set out under Schedule 4 of the Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017 (the determination).
These official duties primarily related to attending the Sydney studios of the Nine Network early in the morning of 8 November 2019.
I had been invited in my official capacity as Minister for Home Affairs to discuss Government and portfolio policy during a live television broadcast of 'Today'. This broadcast took place at approximately 7am on free to air television, and as such is publicly available.
broadcast as a means of facilitating public debate. Similarly travelled from Melbourne to Sydney on 7 November 2019 and attended Nine's Willoughby studios on the morning of 8 November 2019.
Engaging in public debate and communicating Government and portfolio policy has long been an important official duty and role of Ministers. As such, all three limbs of Schedule 4 are engaged in these circumstances.

Further to this, communication is specifically listed under Schedule 1 of the determination, which at 1 c) recognises the need for parliamentarians to travel to undertake communication connected to their policy portfolio.


In 2016 he was selected as the inaugural Best Minister in the World recipient at the World Government Summit.

Mental health is an issue that is particularly important to Greg. Mental health touches nearly every family in Australia and he is making this a focus of his role as Health Minister.




