This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;
 - (b) *member*;

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.



1 Name

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;
 - (b) *member*;
 - (c) *office holder*, and
 - (d) vice regal function.
- (2) For the avoidance of doubt, an activity specified in a Schedule to this determination is specified whether it takes place within Australia or overseas.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (1) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(a) of the Act, the *parliamentary duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 1 for that member.
- (2) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(b) of the Act, the *electorate duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 2 for that member.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.

I'm Pauline Hanson, and I'm a constitutional monarchist.

It may not be fashionable to say so, and it may even seem counter-intuitive, but I am a constitutional monarchist because I understand a simple and undeniable truth: the monarchy is an essential foundation of Australian democracy and sovereignty.

Queen Elizabeth the Second understood this all too well.

The Queen's steadfast support for democracy and national self-determination in the Commonwealth, and across the world, was one of the defining features of her long reign.

The Queen understood it was the Australian people who governed our nation, and she understood her duty as our constitutional monarch was to support whatever decisions we made about the future government of our country.

The Queen never once failed in this duty to the Australian people, and I think that's an important part of the respect and admiration many in this country had for her.

She was a beacon of stability and tradition, and dedication to duty, in a time of unprecedented social and political change.

I could not address you today without acknowledging the Queen and her service to Australia and its people.

She will be missed.

Just as her legacy of service stood the test of time, so has the Australian Constitution.

Our Constitution is a great achievement, reflecting the establishment of a great nation.

People from distant colonies gathered together to debate and draft a Constitution which has served Australia very well over the past 122 years.

This is a remarkable achievement itself, because the architects of the Constitution could not foresee many of the events and developments that would shape Australia and change how it was governed.

The Constitution – and the monarchy's place in it – works best when we stay true to the principles it espouses.

These principles underpin the very strength of Australian representative democracy:

- the right to vote;
- Australian sovereignty over our lands and waters;
- the right to basic individual freedoms; and
- equal political franchise that is one adult, one vote.

It's when you threaten these principles that you undermine the authority of the Constitution, the sovereignty it confers on the Australian people, and democracy itself.

Make no mistake: these principles are under constant threat.

Some threats are obvious, like foreign authoritarian regimes and their constant attacks on our democratic institutions, interference with free elections and disregard for international peace and order.

Some threats are far more insidious, cloaked in fair-sounding rhetoric about inclusion and well-meaning intentions to address social and economic disadvantage.

I am, of course, talking about the proposal to recognise indigenous traditional ownership of Australia in the Constitution and the proposal to enshrine an indigenous 'voice to Parliament' in the Constitution.

I am firmly opposed to these proposals.

Indeed, One Nation will be leading a strong campaign for the 'NO' vote in the coming referendum for these proposals.

It took 66 years for our Constitution to be made colour-blind, and there is no compelling reason why it should be regressed to again single out a number of Australians for different treatment based on their race. Our most celebrated referendum was the one held in 1967, the one which made the Constitution colour-blind.

Australians voted very strongly in favour of removing racist elements from the Constitution – particularly, removing all references to "the aboriginal race".

The Constitution still has many references to indigenous Australians, but strictly in the same capacity as every other Australian, in its numerous references to "people, voters and electors".

This is the way it should be – as far as the Constitution is now concerned, your race is utterly inconsequential with respect to your rights and freedoms in Australia.

This is a tremendously positive achievement that is rightly celebrated in Australia but ironically, these same sentiments threaten to undo this progress and even the sovereignty most Australians have over their own land and water.

The proposal the Constitution must specifically recognise the traditional ownership of indigenous people seems to be based on the idea, promoted by people like Noel Pearson, that we don't recognise indigenous Australians.

That idea makes no sense at all, because it's just not true.

Australia recognises indigenous Australians in a wide variety of ways.

Flags representing indigenous Australians are flown everywhere.

You can't swing a cat these days without hitting someone reciting an "acknowledgement of country".

Countless place names in Australia – including that of our national capital – are derived from indigenous languages.

Some iconic locations have had their names changed to indigenous words – we don't call it Ayer's Rock anymore.

Even our national anthem was recently changed in recognition of indigenous cultural sensitivities.

Indigenous language and culture is taught in our schools.

We have ministers and whole government departments dedicated to aboriginal affairs.

Buckets of taxpayer money are spent directly on indigenous people; it's around 44 thousand dollars per indigenous Australian while it's only around 24 thousand per nonindigenous Australian.

We even have the Closing the Gap report delivered by the Prime Minister each year to report on indigenous progress against national benchmarks – or, more accurately, the lack of progress despite the many billions of dollars thrown at the issue. Adding a few words to the Constitution is not necessary in this context, as we already recognise and celebrate indigenous Australia.

However if the proponents of this idea are successful, and we <u>also</u> subsequently become a republic, the real risk is the sovereignty of the Australian people as represented in the Constitution by the Crown could be replaced with the sovereignty of traditional ownership.

I've consulted legal and constitutional experts on this issue and all of them tell me this risk is real: we could effectively be handing over the sovereignty of the Australian people to a three per cent minority based solely on race.

While Australia is not Australia without its indigenous people, Australia is also much more.

The contributions of all Australians – settlers, convicts, immigrants, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, monarchists and republicans too – have a part in the Australian story.

Australia belongs to all of us, equally – its past, present and most importantly, its future.

I am hopeful the majority of Australians in a majority of states will recognise these truths and reject indigenous traditional ownership being enshrined in the Constitution. If, however, they support it then it will be imperative for us to remain a constitutional monarchy as the only guarantee that all Australians will continue to have ownership and sovereignty of their country.

We cannot count on the High Court to interpret traditional ownership as only 'traditional', and I ask you: do we really even want unelected activist justices to decide the issue?

The other risk to our constitutional principles is the proposed indigenous 'voice to Parliament'.

This proposal has even greater potential for the High Court to effectively govern Australia instead of an elected Parliament.

We're told the proposed 'voice' will be a relatively benign change, giving indigenous Australians more of a say over the policies and legislation which directly affects them and addressing a supposed lack of representation.

Ultimately however, every law passed by Parliament affects all Australians and I wouldn't put it past a future High Court to determine that the proposed 'voice' must be consulted on everything.

And in doing this, we would effectively be giving more political power to a minority of Australians based on race.

They called that "apartheid" in South Africa.

We don't want to see that sort of regime in Australia, yet that is the risk we face.

It's also completely unnecessary – as prescribed by the Constitution, Parliament already provides for effective indigenous representation and consultation with respect to any legislation.

Indigenous Australians do not need a separate voice <u>to</u> Parliament because there are already 227 voices <u>in</u> Parliament representing them – including 11 MPs who selfidentify as indigenous themselves.

Our current system, underpinned by the principles of our Constitution, is absolutely no barrier whatsoever to effective representation of indigenous Australia in the halls of power and the seat of our democracy.

I am also very concerned this proposal will only further divide us, rather than unite us.

Grievance politics – and that's exactly what this is – never unites a people.

On a final note, I must take Peter Dutton and the Coalition to task on this issue.

I'm not alone among conservative Australians in wishing our largest centre-right party would take a principled stand on indigenous recognition and the voice to Parliament. So far, only one Liberal – Northern Territory senator Jacinta Price – has taken a firm position on the voice.

The rest of them are conspicuously silent, and I have concerns this reluctance by Peter Dutton to take a position will ultimately extend to all proposals for constitutional change.

If his party room won't call him out, I certainly will.

This is the Constitution itself – you can't have an each-way bet on these things.

Small target strategies may work for opposition leaders ahead of an election – it certainly worked for Anthony Albanese – but that is more than two years away and conservative Australians need the Coalition to take a stand <u>now</u> on these fundamental issues affecting our future, and even our very identity as a nation and a people.



I am writing on behalf of the Hon. David Littleproud MP in response to your letter dated 11 September2023 seeking assurance in relation to travel conducted on the 30 October-4 November (outlined in *Attachment B*).

As requested, the responses to the questions in *Attachment B* are as follows:

- 1. The intended purpose was to attend in an official capacity as an office holder, the Australian Hotels Association National Board luncheon on Monday 31 October 2022 in Melbourne.
- 2. The intended nature of parliamentary business on Sunday 30 October 2022 was arriving that night in Melbourne in preparation to attend an event in his official capacity the following day.
- 3. Following a late change (explained in question 5 below), the travel to Sydney on the 31 October 2022 was to join other National Party Members and Senators in attending the funeral of Party Trustee, author and esteemed political figure, Mr Paul Davey AM at Camellia Chapel in Macquarie Park Crematorium, Sydney.
- 4. The dominant purpose of David's travel was both of parliamentary and official duties as an office holder and Shadow Minister for Agriculture.
- 5. The parliamentary duties and official business undertaken in Victoria between 31 October and 4th November, included:
 - October 31 Mr Littleproud was invited to attend the Australian Hotels Association National Board luncheon in Melbourne in his capacity as an office holder and it was the intention to attend this event. However, with the funeral of Mr Paul Davey AM being scheduled at the same time meant that a late change was made to fly directly from Melbourne to Sydney return that day to attend the funeral (see attached diary notes).



A DELEGATION of Nationals MPs visited Rochester on Thursday to show their support for the devastated community.

Federal leader David Littleproud said recovery efforts for Rochester would involve all levels of government working together.

"It's important we keep coming back," he said. "I took my time to come to make sure there's some healing and to give the community the opportunity to try and get back on their feet.

"Governments from all levels have worked hard to make sure we're getting back to some level of normality the best we can."

Mr Littleproud was joined by Member for Nichols Sam Birrell and Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh, who will fight for his state seat at this month's election.

"What we want to do now is work with the community, how it recovers, how businesses get re-opened, how the town starts to get going again," Mr Littleproud said.

"Rochester is a very proud

community - they are grateful for the help but they want to help themselves get going again."

The MPs met with business owners who have had to close their shops and deal

with loss of trade due to residents currently living out of town.

Mr Walsh said governments would do what they could to get people to return to the town, and it was

important money spent on Rochester's recovery stayed local. "The key thing with the building and recovery is making sure the purchases made to do that come out of the town," he said. "We don't

want all the materials coming from Bendigo or further away; we want the recovery to base their spending in town so businesses get going again."

Mr Littleproud likened Rochester's recovery to Lismore, New South Wales and said the federal government should extend the deadline for business activity statements and put money into the accounts of flood-affected residents.

He said the government needed to be "courageous to build mitigants like dams to catch water".

"We're a smart country but we've got to have the courage to back ourselves with the science and technology that's there," Mr Littleproud said. "We will get events that bring large quantities of water, the way to mitigate that is not always just diversion, it's about storing and moving on when it's safe to do so."

He said households should be given money to lift the height of their homes.

"Those are the practical things we need to do. We need to work with state and local governments to make sure that when they hold the planning pen, they make sure they use commonsense and they don't put people in harm's way by allowing development of areas that are in harm's way." isentia

Leader warns of a long recovery

Federal Nationals leader David Littleproud has told Goulburn Valley and Campaspe Valley residents to brace for a long clean-up and recovery from last month's flooding.

Mr Littleproud visited Rochester, Undera and Shepparton as well as some orchards in the region affected by Tuesday's hailstorm alongside Federal Member for Nicholls Sam Birrell.

He said there were some tweaks to flood recovery he would urge the Federal Government to make, including making recovery funds exempt from being considered taxable income and making it easier for people to lodge financial statements.

"It's giving some people some time to breathe, take a break to focus on the recovery rather than their finances," Mr Littleproud said.

"We're going to continue to work constructively with the government and I think the government has been responsive during the crisis." Mr Littleproud said the "one

percenters" were needed to help communities rebuild.

"It's things like getting insurance companies to try and source and procure materials locally, like in Rochester they need to get their materials from the Mitre 10 there and it gets people and communities back up on their feet again," he said.

"It's important we keep coming back listening, learning and making sure that if we have to tweak our response we do that.

"It's been really impressive way that people have banded together."

Mr Birrell said he could hardly believe the "devastation" he saw at some rural properties and farms just outside Rochester.

"It's been a really difficult time for the region and we're going to need all the support we can get," he said.

"Farmers are concerned and I've been wanting to talk about the help available."

He urged people to go to flood recovery centres such as the one in Shepparton and in Rochester to see what could be done to help. isentia

FEDERAL Nationals Leader, David Littleproud, was in the Latrobe Valley last week to support the party's \$2.5-billion manufacturing fund ahead of this month's state election.

Mr Littleproud visited Moe engineering firm Safetech to lend his weight to the state campaign, promising that \$1b of the fund would be allocated to regional Victoria.

The Queensland MP also headed-up a forum with local business and industry leaders to discuss establishing an innovative manufacturing hub in the Latrobe Valley.

He said issues such as increasing electricity costs, labour shortages and access to childcare were some of the main issues facing manufacturers in the regions.

"It's important to know you have a future well beyond the industry you've got here at the moment, not just for yourselves but for your family," Mr Littleproud said.

"This is about expanding regional Australia to give them the leg-up to create wealth for this nation.

"This is about making sure small-to-medium

businesses have the opportunity to have a go and make sure they don't have to leave regional Victoria or leave the country."

Safetch co-owner David Wakefield said one of his challenges was competing with offshore companies in bidding for tenders.

Mr Wakefield said it was important for local manufacturers to have the public and political support to remain viable and keep employing people.

"We've sent too much manufacturing offshore for too long, we've stripped our skills base down to almost nothing, it needs to come back here," Mr Wakefield said.

"We have a very successful business based here and have no need to move. We'd like to see a lot more emphasis on rural and regional skills bases and people."

Premier Daniel Andrews claimed near 60,000 jobs would be created under Labor's plan to renationalise the state's power sector after the SEC was sold-off by the Coalition in the 90s.

"I think people in the Latrobe Valley know the record of The Nationals. This was to privatise electricity and nobody has been a winner out of that sale," Mr Andrews said.

1 Name

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;
 - (b) *member*;
 - (c) *office holder*, and
 - (d) vice regal function.
- (2) For the avoidance of doubt, an activity specified in a Schedule to this determination is specified whether it takes place within Australia or overseas.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (1) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(a) of the Act, the *parliamentary duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 1 for that member.

- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;
 - (b) *member*;
 - (c) *office holder*, and
 - (d) vice regal function.
- (2) For the avoidance of doubt, an activity specified in a Schedule to this determination is specified whether it takes place within Australia or overseas.

5 Parliamentary business of members



Driving around the vast electorate, you can see the creeping water which threatens some communities more than others.

One quickly gets an idea of water flows and how important levees, flood inundation overlays and other mitigation measures are when there's a direct threat.

Last Tuesday, Senator Bridget McKenzie and I travelled to Wycheproof to see it firsthand, and to see if we could be useful in any way.

Corey Harrison was busily submitting reports, co-ordinating volunteers and watching gauges whilst trying to explain to us that it's not actually the Tyrrell Creek that is the biggest threat to the township, but the Cooroopajerrup Creek.

Having been the former Emergency Management Minister, the good Senator had a really good understanding of flood mapping, water flows, the support requirements needed and how those at the emergency relief centre might be feeling.

Senator McKenzie has dealt with a couple of Lismore disasters, as well as bushfires during her tenure, so it was incredibly valuable to have her perspective and insight into the situation.

"There is no better intelligence in times like these than local knowledge," said Senator Mc-Kenzie.

"Having you guys on the ground here is absolutely vital. You know the land, you've seen it all before and you know where the water will go. There's nothing more valuable than local knowledge."

We were lucky enough to have a personal tour guided by CFA member Ian Amel, who took great pride in showing us the community spirit that was building new levee

banks in place of crops, sandbagging homes that lay in the path of potential destruction and showing us the lay of the land as far as the Tyrrell and Cooroopajerrup creeks go.

I wasn't going to allow the good Senator to visit Wycheproof without summiting the Mountain of course and whilst up there, inspecting the new wetlands project and getting a more vast view of the district.

We did want to be useful and helpful rather than just being in the way, so we asked Ian to take us to the sandbagging station where the Parks crew were taking loads out. So whilst they were gone, we thought we'd leave them a little gift of another pallet of prepared, perfectly stacked sandbags, left by the National Party.

Knowing that we couldn't get to Charlton that day, we also visited and spoke with the displaced residents at the emergency relief centre. It still amazes me how resilient Mallee folk are.

"How are you going?"

"Ok, not much we can do about it is there? It is what it is?" is the general response.

We really appreciate

the hospitality and time taken with Corey, Ian and the local and visiting SES crews to help us understand where the water is coming from, where it's going and what will be needed post any flood event.

I'm only a phone call away if you need more help with sandbagging and pallet stacking.

Sea Lake Pub Test

It's all well and good for aspiring politicians and parties to make promises and commitments around elections, and a lot of work has gone into National Party policies.

However, sometimes, what the parties may think is a good idea, doesn't actually resonate with the people. I believe everyone and everything should be put through the pub test.

Meaning, if you were at a pub and the conversation about XYZ came up, what would the opinion of Munga be, on the night of his 60th birthday?

Well, we did just that, on the night of Munga's 60th birthday and didn't I get a swift lesson in a number of things? It was all highly entertaining of course.

The central theme that quickly emerged was the Mallee Rally and the pending Cultural Heritage report pertaining to Lake Tyrrell.

Now I make no secret of the fact that I am a motorsport fan. Motorbikes first, but anything that makes loud noises and goes fast is good enough for me, so I too am waiting with bated breath to read the contents of this report, which, I have not seen as yet.

Once this report is released, which I expect to be post-election, the coalition government can start working with all stakeholders to protect sacred lands whilst at the same time bringing back Sea Lake's largest event, not just in terms of dollars into the local economy, but in terms of town morale.

Assurance Review of travel and travel-related expenses

The Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority (IPEA) has responsibility under the Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority Act 2017 to review work expenses accessed by parliamentarians.

On 8 September 2023 and 31 October 2023, IPEA wrote to you about an Assurance Review of travel expenses incurred by you for travel to Sydney and Melbourne between 31 October and 2 November 2022.

On 15 December 2023, your staff member responded to IPEA and provided information on the purpose of your travel, as well as supporting documentation.

Following this correspondence, IPEA has further questions in relation to your use of parliamentary business resources to undertake this travel.

The principles parliamentarians are to apply when utilising public resources are set out in Part 3 -Division 2 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017* (the PBR Act). In summary, parliamentarians are personally responsible and accountable for their use of public resources. They must be prepared to publicly justify their use of public resources for conducting their parliamentary business and must act ethically and in good faith in using, and accounting for the use of, those resources. Further, parliamentarians are only able to claim public resources, including the work expenses prescribed in the Parliamentary Business Resources Regulations, if their travel is for the dominant purpose of conducting their parliamentary business.

Section 6 of the PBR Act and the Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017 (the Determination – Attachment A) define the four streams of parliamentary business. These are parliamentary duties, electorate duties, party political duties and official duties. The Determination also provides examples of what constitutes parliamentary business within the four streams.

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

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;

 - (d) vice regal function.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.

Further to previous correspondence with my office in relation to an IPEA Assurance Review into transportation costs on Monday October 30, 2022, I am providing the following explanation.

As outlined previously by my office, I travelled from Sydney to Melbourne on October 30, 2022, to enable me to attend a Melbourne Cup function the following day, for which supporting documentation has been provided. I used a COMCAR to travel from Melbourne Airport to my hotel in Melbourne (noting that my home base is Wodonga). I did not use a COMCAR to travel to and from the event.

You have requested that I am to specify "the nature" of parliamentary business under Regulation 98 of the Parliamentary Resources Regulations, 2017 and how my attendance at the event constitutes parliamentary business.

I was invited to the event by a racing industry stakeholder, Tabcorp.

The sole reason I was invited to attend the function was in my capacity as Senator for Victoria and the Shadow Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development. The sole reason I agreed to attend was because of my capacity as Senator for Victoria.

The Melbourne Cup is the showcase annual event of this important and valuable industry, which I support, engage with, and which is also a major stakeholder.

The Victorian racing industry is an important contributor to the state that I represent, generating \$3.2 billion expenditure into the state's economy, and directly employing 34,900 people, according to a report commissioned by Racing Victoria.

According to the 2022 IER Pty Ltd report, entitled "Size and Scope of the Victorian Racing Industry", there were also 1,458 breeders, 956 trainers, 71,388 owners, and 4,741 volunteers in the thoroughbred industry alone in Victoria the year surveyed (more are employed in other codes such as harness and greyhounds). This estimate does not include the employees of racing clubs (6,660), employees of wagering businesses (2,746), and other participants including volunteers in the industry (5,275).

This stakeholder is particularly vital for regional Victoria, evidence for which is outlined on page 22 of the report that can be found with this link: <u>26e5c9be3387485aa5de00d426012fd4.ashx (racingvictoria.com.au)</u> The racing industry helps underpin the economies of many regional centres.

1 Name

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (2) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(b) of the Act, the *electorate duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 2 for that member.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.

I refer to **email** of 22 March 2024 responding to IPEA's request for information relating to your request to repay expenses associated with your use of Cabcharge on 1 November 2022. Thank you for providing this information.

email indicates that you wish to repay this expense notwithstanding your position that it was incurred for the dominant purpose of parliamentary business. IPEA has taken this request to indicate that the repayment is not associated with a breach of your obligations under section 26, 27 or 28 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act* 2017 (the Act).

Please note that section 39 of the Act deals with voluntary repayments, that is a repayment not made because of a parliamentarian breaching their obligations under the PBR Act. Section 39 provides that where a parliamentarian makes a repayment in relation to a claim for a public resource and that repayment is made more than 28 days after the day of the claim, a penalty loading up to 25% may be applied. The expressed intention of the penalty loading provisions in relation to voluntary repayments is to ensure "consistent treatment for all members when making repayments".

This instrument is the *Parliamentary Business Resources (Parliamentary Business) Determination 2017.*

2 Commencement

This instrument commences at the same time as the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

3 Authority

This instrument is made under section 6 of the *Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017*.

4 Interpretation

(1) In this instrument:

Act means the Parliamentary Business Resources Act 2017.

- Note: A number of expressions used in this instrument are defined in the definitions section of the Act, including the following:
 - (a) constituent;
 - (b) *member*;
 - (c) *office holder*, and
 - (d) vice regal function.
- (2) For the avoidance of doubt, an activity specified in a Schedule to this determination is specified whether it takes place within Australia or overseas.

5 Parliamentary business of members

- (1) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(a) of the Act, the *parliamentary duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 1 for that member.
- (2) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(b) of the Act, the *electorate duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 2 for that member.
- (3) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(c) of the Act, the *party political duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 3 for that member.
- (4) For the purposes of paragraph 6(4)(d) of the Act, the *official duties* of a member are the activities specified in Schedule 4 for that member.



Radio royalty Jonesy & Amanda will host the 33rd annual Australian Commercial Radio Awards (the ACRAS) when the event returns to Sydney this month after a three-year hiatus.

Radio personalities from around the country will be among 1,000 guests at radio's night of nights, which recognises outstanding achievement across entertainment, music, news, talk and sport. The event also acknowledges community service, with radio playing a key role during the pandemic and recent natural disasters.

This is the first time Jonesy & Amanda have hosted the ACRAS.

"We know they looked into getting a big international star to host, then they checked the budget. Next, they checked with the fellas from The Chaser but their backstage rider included Twisties ... so the accountant said no. We were already going – and Jonesy doesn't have to get his suit back to 'Kelly Country' until November. Bring it on!" the popular WSFM breakfast duo said.

The Chaser's Chris Taylor and Andrew Hansen hosted the event when it was last held in Brisbane in 2019. This year's ACRAS will be held at the International Convention Centre at Darling Harbour on Saturday, October 29.

Jonesy & Amanda are finalists for the Best On Air Team award in the FM category, up against the Kyle & Jackie O Show (KIIS 106.5), Fitzy & Wippa (Nova 96.9), Kate, Tim & Joel (Nova Network) and The Christian O'Connell Show (Gold 104.3).

Twelve radio stations have been nominated for Best Community Service Project for outstanding efforts to raise support and awareness for community programs and charities. These include projects supporting mental health, road safety awareness, victims of the floods and children's health and welfare.

The community service awards will be presented by Susan Templeman MP, who was appointed by the Albanese Government as Special Envoy for the Arts in June.

Ford Ennals, the CEO of awards organiser and industry body Commercial Radio & Audio, said: "The ACRAS are back and we are very excited to roll out the red carpet and recognise the achievements of the industry which have seen radio audiences climb to record highs."

"Commercial radio stations support more than 200 community service organisations each year through air-time and promotions. The ACRA finalists exemplify the authentic connection radio stations have with their listeners and the many ways they use this to serve their communities, whether that is providing entertainment, information, disaster relief, supporting those in need, raising funds for health research or getting the conversation started on difficult issues."

The finalists for Best Community Service Project include Nova 91.9's breakfast hosts Ben Harvey and Liam Stapleton, who broadcast live while locked inside a glass cage in Adelaide's Rundle Mall for five days to help raise awareness for mental health. The initiative, which aimed to draw parallels to the feeling of being trapped in your own head, achieved massive community engagement while also raising donations that funded the specialist training program for 30 new Lifeline crisis supporters.

Another finalist is Mix 106.3's "Pack the Bus" which saw the Canberra station take Santa and his helpers on a twoweek journey around the region to collect items for those in need. The charity partner Communities at Work said the frequent on-air promotions helped them collect over 6,000 donations – a 120% increase over the previous year - and the number of online financial donations doubled.

Also in the running for an award are entries from 106.3 Triple M in Coffs Harbour, for shining a light on road safety; 90.9 SeaFM Gold Coast's Bianca, Dan & Ben's Flood Watch supporting the victims of flooding; Nova 106.9's "Nova's Bids for Sick Kids", which raised money for the Children's Hospital Foundation; i98's long-running Illawarra Convoy; and the Christian O'Connell Show's "We've Got Your Back" project, which charity Backpacks 4 Vic Kids described as their most successful campaign of all time.

Entries for the ACRAS were received from 260 metropolitan and regional radio stations across Australia. Winners are peer judged by industry members. A highlight is the Hall of Fame inductee, acknowledging a lifelong commitment to the Australian radio industry.

The ACRAS red carpet will start at 5pm AEDT on Saturday, October 29, with the awards ceremony at 6pm AEDT.


